



DENTAL APPOINTMENT INSTRUCTIONS

Pre-Dental Checklist

- Please do not give any food after midnight the evening before the procedure. Your pet may have water.
- Please print the following form and present it at time of check in
- When you come in for check in, plan at least 15 minutes to have your pet be admitted by a doctor.
- Upon dismissal, plan a at least 30 minutes for dismissal and discussion of treatment and aftercare instructions.

Pre anesthetic Blood Diagnostics Information

Pre anesthetic blood work gives the doctor information regarding your pet's vital internal organs. We are especially concerned with the health of the liver and kidneys because these organs help the body metabolize the medications used during anesthesia. We strongly recommend completing this simple blood work to help ensure the safety of your pet.

**Pre-Anesthetic Blood Screen checks the condition of the following:

We recommend a blood profile to ensure that your pet is in a low risk category prior to anesthesia. The blood chemistry checks the following: Anemia (PCV), Kidney (BUN and Creatinine), Liver (ALKP and ALT), Sugar (Glucose), hydration (TP) and Electrolytes (Sodium, Potassium and Chloride).

Extended Treatment:

Due to the amounts of plaque and tartar on the teeth, it is difficult to determine the health and treatment of the teeth and gums until after they are cleaned. Upon cleaning and X-Ray examination, your pet may need tooth and gum treatments that may include extractions, bonded sealants or periodontal therapy caused by infections in the bone, periodontal (gum) disease, abscesses, cysts, abnormalities or tumors. Additional cost will be added based on extended treatments administered. The doctor will attempt to call you at the phone number provided to discuss treatment options while your pet is under anesthesia.

If I am unable to be contacted while my pet is under anesthesia, Complete the necessary extended treatments.

General anesthesia is usually safe for healthy pets. Pets with heart, lung, or kidney problems may have a higher risk of having problems with general anesthesia.
