Pre-Surgery Checklist

- Please do not give any food after midnight. Your pet may have water.
- Please print the following form and present it at time of check in.
- When you come in for check in, plan at least 15 minutes to have your pet be admitted by a doctor.
- Upon dismissal, plan a at least 30 minutes for dismissal and discussion of aftercare instructions.

Pre anesthetic Blood Diagnostics Information

Pre anesthetic blood work gives the doctor information regarding your pet's vital internal organs. We are especially concerned with the health of the liver and kidneys because these organs help the body metabolize the medications used during anesthesia. We strongly recommend completing this simple blood work to help ensure the safety of your pet.

Pre-Anesthetic Blood Screen checks the condition of the following:

Cost = \$70.80

We recommend a blood profile to ensure that your pet is in a low risk category prior to anesthesia. The blood chemistry checks the following: Anemia (PCV), Kidney (BUN and Creatinine), Liver (ALKP and ALT), Sugar (Glucose), Electrolytes, Complete Blood Cell Count (CBC) which includes checking White Blood Cells (WBC), Red Blood Cells (RBC) and Platelets.

Microchip:

Cost = \$47.92

While your pet is under anesthesia, we can microchip your pet for permanent identification. Every year more than 20 million dogs and cats are put to sleep because humane shelters cannot identify them or their owner. A microchip is an unmistakable sign that the pet is not only loved, but very much wanted! This fee covers all costs including the enrollment in the AKC Companion Animal Recovery service database.

Fluoride Treatment

Cost = \$14.69

When your pet comes in to be spayed or neutered (between 6-12 months of age), a fluoride treatment will be applied to your pet's teeth while under anesthesia. This treatment strengthens the enamel of the newly erupted teeth and prevents cavities, plaque and reduces sensitivity.

Extended Treatment:

If for any reason, additional services need to be performed while your pet is under anesthesia, the doctor will attempt to call and discuss them with you at the phone number provided. **If I am unable to be contacted while my pet is under anesthesia, complete necessary treatments.**

General anesthesia is usually safe for healthy pets. Pets with heart, lung, or kidney problems may have a higher risk of having problems with general anesthesia.
